This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

As a school we use the Charanga scheme to support our music teaching. The Charanga Education Music scheme is an online platform designed to support music education in primary schools. It provides teachers with a comprehensive resource for delivering music lessons, featuring a wide range of songs, curriculum-linked activities, and teaching materials. The scheme emphasizes hands-on learning and encourages creativity through interactive lessons that cover various musical styles and instruments. Charanga aims to make music accessible and engaging for students, helping them develop their musical skills and appreciation. It also offers tools for assessment and progress tracking, making it a valuable resource for educators.

Music is taught for an hour a week.

This year the children in year 3 have the opportunity to learn the Ukulele, children from across the school take part in Rock Steady lessons – they can earn credits towards qualifications from Rock Steady.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Singing worship takes place once a week in the hall.

We have a school choir, who will be performing at Young voices and the trust music concert.

Rock Steady lessons go on weekly and the children involve perform 3 times a year, this provision is made for by the school.

Year 3 have weekly Ukulele lessons provided by Kent music.

We have 3 productions a year – for all year groups.

We have a weekly visit from a guitar teacher.
